

ON 6-7 OCTOBER, MACN WELCOMED OVER 200
REPRESENTATIVES, GUEST SPEAKERS AND EXPERTS
AT ITS AUTUMN MEMBERS' MEETING

At the meeting the membership approved the high-level 2022 workplan as presented by the Secretariat. A summary of the priorities is as follows:

CAPABILITY BUILDING

- Develop and expand MACN's Helpdesks
- Continue to support and further develop eLearning
- Develop digital community solutions such as the third party risk management community platform
- Continue to conduct best practice sharing with a focus on compliance, frontline perspectives and member stories.

COLLECTIVE ACTION

- Continue to focus on in-country work in line with MACN's updated collective action strategy
- Continue to focus on corruption risks with Port State Control
- Explore corruption risks beyond port operations.

COLLABORATION INITIATIVES

- Continue to be present in the development of an IMO guideline to tackle maritime corruption
- Continue to co-lecture at the World Maritime University and seek partnership with academia
- Members are keen to meet in person. The Secretariat will explore the possibility of having two member meetings or one global meeting supported by a number of regional meetings.

UKRAINE LOCAL PARTNER ANK

MACN together with its local partner ANK and other industry stakeholders, constantly monitor integrity risks of port related challenges in Ukraine, which thereby assists in developing and updating relevant Integrity Tools for members. MACN travelled to Ukraine in December 2021 to meet with its local partners and expand ongoing engagement work with key stakeholders on MACN's collective action work.

NEW HELPDESK IN EGYPT

IN OCTOBER MACN OPENED A HELPDESK IN EGYPT VIA ITS LOCAL PARTNER, ELDIB PANDI

To establish targeted strategies for its work in Egypt, MACN conducted a survey for members that will help it identify key ports, canals, actors, and the severity of demands being made in Egypt. MACN is currently analysing the survey responses.

NIGERIAN AUTHORITIES STEPPING UP ANTI-CORRUPTION ENFORCEMENT AT PORTS AND TERMINALS

A notice has advised of a pre-arrival process that has been put in place for vessels calling at Nigerian ports and terminals to allow for port call progress to be monitored by a Port Standing Task Team (PSTT), along with an MACN Local Help Desk team in Nigeria. This is in response to a new policy from the Nigerian government to ban ships and companies calling at Nigerian ports and terminals from offering gifts and other forms of facilitation payments to officials from the Port Health, Immigration, Customs, and other agencies involved in the boarding and inspection of vessels.

Any form of corrupt demand made towards a vessel's Captain, the shipping company, or their respective appointed stakeholder(s) should be immediately reported to the Port Standing Task Team (PSTT) and MACN Local Help Desk who will provide timely advice on next steps.

363 port calls registered of which 47 were incidents. 45 incidents were successfully resolved.

ANONYMOUS INCIDENT REPORTING

MACN's anonymous incident reporting system enables member and non-members to submit incident reports when a vessel is faced with corrupt demands during port operation. The results of the anonymous incident reporting allows MACN members to learn from each other to potentially avoid similar incidents in their own operations. MACN has collected over 41,000 incident reports of corrupt demands globally. MACN uses this data to analyse trends in frequency of incidents, allowing MACN to target Collective Action efforts and engage with governments.

TOP 5 PORTS

There was a high number of reported incidents in both October and November 2021 with 326 and 368 incidents respectively. The Suez Canal in Egypt featured prominently in both months with the 16 incidents in October almost doubling to 29 incidents in November. The other ports with a large number of incidents in the two months were also in Africa with Alger/Algiers in Algeria reporting 26 incidents in October, while Alexandria in Egypt had 24 incidents in November. - 79% of incidents involved demand for cigarettes
- A variety of actors were involved in the demands including pilots, customs, electricians and the immigration authority
- · The safety of the vessel was the most common type of threat.
